Henry Fey, 85, a pioneer residen of this vicinity, passed away Sunda; morning, June 29, 1941, at the home of his denoted by 1941, at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Bert Thompson in Anthon, Iowa. Mr. Fey suffered : stroke a few days previous, and failed to recover.

Henry Fey, son of George Fey and Florentine Schneider, was born May 21, 1856, in Wunderthausen, Ger many, and in 1868, at the age of 14 years, he came to America with his mother, his two brothers, Philip and

George, and his sister, Anna. The family settled on farms in the vicinity of Wheatland, and helped in every way to make this community thrive and prosper.

Mr. Fey was married to Elizabeth Luckel on Nov. 3, 1882, in St. Pauls German Reformed church, with which they were affiliated during their many years of married life.

To them were born thirteen child ren, eleven of whom survive their father, namely: Henry of Correction-ville, Ia.; Louis, William and Mrs Elizabeth Thompson of Anthon, Ia. Philip of Oelrich, S. D.; Albert of De-troit, Mich.; Frank of Massillon; Johr of Davenport; Mrs. Lena Ackermar of Detroit, Mich.; Mrs. Amelia Es-terbrook of Davenport; Mrs. Florentine Crelly of Lisbon. One daugh-ter, Mrs. Alma McCoy, died in 1933 and one son, George, died in infancy. He is also survived by 11 grandtine Crelly of Lisbon. children and 6 great-grandchildren.

Following the death of his beloved wife in 1931, Mr. Fey has made his home among his children, and had been in fair health up to the time of his brief and final illness.

The body was brought from An-thon to the Balster funeral home at Lost Nation Sunday night, and to the Balster funeral home here yesterday morning, where a short prayer service yesterday afternoon at 1:45 preceded final rites in St. Pauls church at 2 o'clock, with Rev. Clarence Koehler officiating.
