Funeral services for Mrs. Marie Schneider, Wheatland's oldest resident, who died at her home home morning, March 4th, 1940, were held last Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock at St. Pauls Evangelical and Reformed church, following a short prayer service at the home. Walter Thiele, Raymond Fox, Irvin Schneider, Norman Schneider, Lawrence Witte and Louis Witte, grandsons of the deceased, served as pall bearers, and flowers were in charge of Mrs. Edna Alexander and Miss Vivian Thomas. Burial was made in St. Pauls cemetery.

Marie Magdalena Knoche was born May 3, 1846, in Wunderthausen, Westphalia, Germany, where she was baptized in infancy and later confirmed in the Evangelical faith.

The lure of better things in the United States prompted her to leave the old country, and she came to this country on the "Hansa," the first steamship to make the Atlantic crossing. She arrived here on her nineteenth birthday, May 3, 1865, and a little over two years later, on Oct. 17, 1867, she was united in marriage to Mr. Louis Schneider, by Rev. J. Rettig of St. Pauls Reformed church. Mrs. Schneider began their married life on the farms southers married life on the farms southers married life on the farms southers of Wheatland, now owned by their son Ferdinand, and there they lived and prospered until in 1904 they built a new home in Wheatland and retired to enjoy the fruits of their labor. Mr. Schneider died in 1921, and since that time her constant companion in the home has been her daughter, Miss Emilie.

Mrs. Schneider was the oldest member of St. Pauls church, and a harter member of the Ladies Aid of that church. She was a most aithful member, attending church services regularly until her health in her Creator, she was a wery devoted mother to her children and heir families, and her prayers were for all her friends, and especially for hose who were ill or unfortunate. She accepted life as it was offered to her, making the best of all hings, and being likewise practical, she looked forward to the end of life is a part of her own task, even so far is h
